Rationale

Matching is a simple form of sorting and the beginning of logical thinking. Children learn 1-1 correspondence, and begin to look at representation. Sets is a precursor to counting. It is the basis of cardinality and 1-1 correspondence.

Concept Sequence

- Match objects provide opportunities for children to match objects which are the same, recognise attributes. Use language same/different to see objects that don't match.
- Match pictures and objects move to match pictures with pictures.
- Identify a set encourage seeing groups of objects as sets. Model making sets. Make deliberate mistakes for children to correct eg. setting a table.
- Sort objects to a type collections can be sorted based on attributes such as colour, size or shape. Consider what is the same/different. Use lining up times. Collect Autumn leaves/seeds. Tidy up time.
- Explore sorting techniques encourage children to make their own criteria for sorting.
 Sort in different ways.
- Create sorting rules Play 'Guess my rule'.
- Compare amounts compare and order. Sets can have more, same, fewer. Easier when the difference in sets is greater. Begin to line up using 1-1 correspondence to see which line is longer (five frame to help).
